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User Story	Acceptance Criteria
As a customer, I want to transfer money between my accounts so that I can manage my finances easily.	<ul> <li>When the customer selects the Transfer option and chooses the source and destination accounts, the system should display the available balance in the source account.</li> <li>The transfer amount must be less than or equal to the available balance.</li> <li>When the customer confirms the transfer, the system should immediately deduct the amount from the source account and add it to the destination account. It should then display a confirmation message on the screen.</li> <li>The transfer must be logged with a timestamp and a unique transaction ID.</li> </ul>
As a team member, I want to log my work hours on tasks so that I can track and bill my time accurately.	<ul> <li>The system should allow the team member to log hours worked on each task, with an option to specify the date and time period.</li> <li>The logged hours must be visible to both the team member and the project manager, with the ability to edit or delete entries as needed.</li> <li>The system should automatically calculate total hours worked per task and display this information in the task details.</li> <li>The user should be able to export logged hours to a timesheet for billing purposes.</li> </ul>
As a product owner, I want to prioritize the product backlog so that the most valuable features are developed first.	<ul> <li>The system should allow the product owner to assign a priority level to each user story in the product backlog.</li> <li>When the priority is updated, the system should automatically reorder the backlog to reflect the new priority.</li> <li>The product owner should be able to filter stories by priority, status, and assigned team members.</li> <li>The system should also allow the product owner to add notes or comments to each story, explaining the reasoning behind the priority level.</li> </ul>

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
